

BUT Fu 畢虎

Director, Screenwriter, Producer

As early as 1934, But Fu had starred in *Bible for Girls* (1934), produced by Star Motion Picture Co., Ltd in Shanghai. But came to Hong Kong before the city's fall to the Japanese, where he directed his debut film *One Hundred Thousand Children's Corpses* (1940). He later went on to direct a number of Cantonese *wenyi* films for Nanyang Film Company, such as *The Woman of My Dream* (1941) and *The Phoenix Marries a Crow* (1941), etc.

After China's victory over Japan in WWII, But directed such films as The Spy Lovers in the Dangerous City (1947) and The Inscrutable Heart of Women (1947). In 1947, overseas Chinese entrepreneurs from the Philippines, Esteban Ngo and Dai Youmin, arrived in Hong Kong to establish Hsin Kuang Film Company. Together they raised the funds needed to produce A Belated Encounter (1948), a Hong Kong Amoy-dialect film directed by But and starring Bai Yun and Lou Hung. In the same year, he went on to direct the Cantonese production Warmth of Home (1948) and its Amoy-dialect version, The Air is Cleared (1948), marking the release of the first Amoydialect film in Hong Kong. From 1949 to 1951, But primarily directed Cantonese films, such as A Royal Scandal (aka Tan Kei in the Meat Hill, 1949), The Conquest (aka Sex to Kill the Devil, 1949), The Impenetrable Pipa Spirit on Fire (1950), and A White Python Usurps the Dragon's Palace (1950). From 1952 onwards, with the increase of popularity of Amoy-dialect films among the audience, But started to focus on shooting such films as The Story of Chen San and Fifth Madam (1952), Liang Shanbo and Zhu Yingtai (aka Butterfly Lovers, 1952) and Luoyang Bridge (1952), etc. Later he formed his own eponymous company, producing such Amoy-dialect films as The Beautiful Vegetable Grower (1954), Flower Terrace (1956), All Mixed Up (1956), Fairy and Man (1957), An Embroidered Shoe (1958), and The Teenager (1960), all were directed by him. In the meantime, he also directed Amoy-dialect films for other companies. Most of the Amoy-dialect films he directed starred sisters Lou Fen and Lou Hung, as well as Pai Lan in leading roles. Furthermore, But also directed the Amoy-dialect film Love Deep as the Sea (1954) produced in Malaya, and the Taiwanese-dialect film from Taiwan, Waiting For a Better Day (1957).

From the late 1960s to early 1970s, But directed *Golden Sand* (1969) and *Families Are Impossible* (1971) in Taiwan. He went on to set up another company, But Fu (HK) Motion Picture Co., producing his directorial works including *Black and White Umbrellas* (1971) and *Tigers at Top* (1975). He later immigrated to the US with his family. But directed over 70 films throughout his career, in which more than 20 were Amoy-dialect films. His wife is Amoy film star Lou Fen.
