

## CHEUNG Wai-kwong 蔣偉光 (1910.7.11-1991.5.2)

## **Director**

Birth name Chang Tze-kay, Cheung Wai-kwong was born to father Cheung Sau-san, a Chinese expat in Cuba of Xinhui Meige, Guangdong ancestry. Cheung studied at Guangzhou's Lingnan University for a period of time. Prior to joining the film industry, he wrote scripts for Cantonese opera troupes. While stranded in the US during WWII, Cheung met Joseph Sunn (aka Chiu Shusun), the founder of the Grandview Film Company Limited. Cheung was later hired to direct several films for the Grandview (U.S. Branch), including *The Perfect Couple* (1947), *Eternal Love* (1947) and *Way to Brightness* (1946), with the latter credited under his birth name.

A prolific director, Cheung directed over 160 films over the course of his career. In 1951, he joined the Tai Seng Film Company that would result in a long-term partnership, and directed such films as Tears for an Absent Love (1953), If Only We'd Met When I Was Single (1955) and A Buddhist Recluse for Fourteen Years (1958). In 1956, Cheung left Tai Seng to start his own studio, the Chung Kwong Motion Picture Co., and directed a series of Cantonese opera films such as The Fairy in the Picture (1957) and A Poor Girl (1959). He also directed A Respectable Tutor (1959) and The Lion's Roar (1959) for Tao Yuen Motion Picture Development Company. In 1961, Cheung was recruited by the Cantonese Film Unit of the Shaw Brothers (Hong Kong) Ltd, and directed Manhunt (1961) and The Robe (1962) among others. His expansive filmography encompassed a wide range of genres besides Cantonese opera films, including family melodrama Do unto Others as They Do unto You (1954), social satirical teen drama Teddy Boys and Teddy Girls (1965), spy film The Powerful Spies (1965), wenyi romance The Rebellion (1966), youth musical / Love A-gogo (1967), etc. However, the director was best-known for his box-office hit comedies like She Says 'No' to Marriage (1951) and Sweet Time Together (1956). His success at the box office earned him the nickname, 'God of Fortune Director'. A staunch supporter of innovation, Cheung was also keen on fostering new talents. Actors Kong Yat-fan, Woo Fung and Adam Cheng have all been sponsored or endorsed by Cheung.

Cheung had three wives: Wong Po-kam, Mak Pan-hing and Cho Lai-ching. Wong was a Cantonese opera actress playing *huadan* (young female) roles and mother to Cheung's only son, Wan-sang. Mak was also a renowned *huadan*. She used the alias Mak Kar-chen when working as a production manager for *The Tragedy of a Double Marriage* (1954) directed by her husband, before adopting the name 'Mak Hing' when she served as the producer of two Chung Kwong productions, *A Mad Rush into Love* (1968) and *Boys and Girls* (1969). From the late 1960s to the early 1970s, Cantonese cinema experienced a downturn. Cheung retired from the film industry after directing the Mandarin film *Model's Romance* (1971). He immigrated to Canada in the early 1980s. He passed away of illness in Vancouver on 2 May 1991.
