

DING Lan 丁蘭 (b. 1938)

Actress

Born Chen Yunlan, Ding Lan was a native of Jinjiang from the Fujian Province of China. She graduated from Hong Kong's Chung Ch'en College, and was fluent in Cantonese, the Amoydialect, Mandarin and English. After graduating from secondary school, she worked as an editor at a newspaper, before she began acting in Amoy-dialect films in 1956. Ding debuted professionally as Du Mei in Ong Law Ho (aka Tiger Wang Snatches His Bride), followed by The Champion Beauty Falls for the Oil Vendor and Madam Zhou Cheng in Search of Her Husband (all in 1956). After signing on with Yicheng Film Company, Ding was cast as a leading lady for the first time in *The Mysterious Case of Qing Zhu Si* (1956), she then followed with her star-making turn in the breakout hit, Peach Blossom Village (1957), after which Ding was nicknamed the 'Fujianese Marilyn Monroe'. Ding went on to establish Global Film Company in 1958, where she both produced and starred in such Amoy-dialect films as Over Shoes over Boots (1958), The Frivolous Professor (1959) and Too Late to Realize (1959). With the decline in Amoy cinema, Ding co-starred in the Cantonese film Playful Young Folks (1965) with Lam Fung and Woo Fung, while Cheung Wai-kwong directed the film. In 1966, she joined the ensemble cast of Taiwanese star Wang Mo-Chou and Korean actor Shin Young-kyun to make the Mandarin film Eternity. Ding married and retired from filmmaking in that same year.
