

## **HU Tong** 胡同 (Year of birth unknown-1968.12.26)

## **Actor, Lyricist, Composer, Director**

Born Hu Xunfa, also known as Hu Feng, Hu Tong was a native of Tong'an in Fujian province. In the early 1950s, he served as the manager of the newly established Nanfeng Film Company. He was responsible for the release of box-office hits Tang Bohu's Seduction of Qiuxiang (aka Tong Peck Hor Tiam Chiu Heong) (Part 1 & 2, 1952-53), with Hu himself also playing supporting roles in the films. With The Romance of Lychee and Mirror (Part 1-3, 1953-54), Hu began to star in leading roles. He would come to perform in over 100 Amoy-dialect films, most of them were in supporting roles, but occasionally Hu also played the films' protagonists. Besides acting, Hu tried his hand at various roles behind-the-scenes, serving as assistant director in An Orphan's Tears (1957), as well as composing lyrics for the songs featured in Lian San Pak Chok Yin Tai (aka The Butterfly Lovers, 1955), Two Sisters in a Turbulent World (aka Sisters Two, 1957) and Honeymoon Hiccups (1958). Sometimes Hu would don multiple hats at the same time, working as screenwriter, assistant director, composer and actor in films including Story of the White Fan (1958), Choosing a Son-in-Law (1958) and The Driver Takes a Wife (aka Phony Phoenixes, 1959), which made him a versatile and multi-talented filmmaker. With the decline in Amoy-dialect films, Hu joined Shaw Brothers (Hong Kong) Ltd as a regular player in 1965 and performed in Mandarin films such as The Perfumed Arrow (1966), The Trail of the Broken Blade (1967), Susanna (1967), The Assassin (1967) and more.

Amoy-dialect film star Xiao Wen was his ex-wife; his second wife was another Amoy-dialect film actress, Marie (alias Ma Li) from Taiwan. Hu died of cerebral hemorrhage while filming *The Singing Escort* (1969) for the Shaw Brothers in Japan.
