

## IP Kwong-kim 葉廣儉

## Screenwriter, Associate Producer, Producer

Born in Hong Kong, Ip Kwong-kim is of Heshan, Guangdong descent. While a history major at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, Ip was already zealously scripting and directing plays while simultaneously writing radio dramas part-time at Commercial Radio. After graduation he worked for the Festival of Asian Arts, before joining Television Broadcasts Limited (TVB) where for two years he was a copywriter in the publicity department. His university classmate Fong Lee-kun then brought him into the movie industry, and he made films with the Yuen Brothers, serving as assistant director for Taoism Drunkard (1984) and Lucky Diamond (1985). In the mid-1980s, Jp. was recruited by Stephen Shin to take part in screenwriting for Brotherhood (1986). In 1987, he joined D & B Films Co., Ltd. as the creative director, responsible for developing stories for film. He had a hand in scripting Easy Money (with co-writers Pang Tsai-choi and Wai Ka-fai, 1987); then facilitated by Fong Lee-kun, he fostered numerous collaborations between Yuen Woo-ping and D & B. Yuen's debut work at D & B, Tiger Gate aka Sure Fire (co-written with Anthony Wong Wing-fai, 1988), was also scripted by Ip. He went on to script the middle-class comedy *Heart to* Hearts (with co-writers Nip Wang-fung [aka Chan Hing-kai], Siu Kwok-wah, Gordon Chan, and So Fung-yee, 1988), a box-office hit and critical success which won the screenwriting team Best Screenplay at the 8th Hong Kong Film Awards.

Ip got along with co-writers of *Heart to Hearts*, Gordon Chan and Chan Hing-kai, forming what was known as the 'Golden Trio'. The three and Lawrence Cheng subsequently founded People's Productions. Ip took part in developing the idea for the company's debut work *The Yuppie Fantasia* (1989). A box-office success, the film got the studio off on the right foot and started the trend of middle-class comedy. Ip left D & B to commit himself completely to his studio. At People's Productions, he was associate producer for *Alien Wife* (1991) and *Inspector Pink Dragon* (1991); and produced *Never Ending Summer* (1992), *The Final Option* (1994), and *He and She* (1994). The studio's productions not only carried on with the urban comedy style, but also explored other genres as evidenced by thriller *Murder* (1993) which he played a role in producing, plot design, and screenwriting. From there, Ip went on to produce *A Touch of Evil* (co-written with Tony Au and Calvin Poon Yuen-leung, 1995) and *First Option* (1996).

Ip consistently created screenplays from the late 1980s to the early years of the 21st century. His collaborative works include *Saviour of the Soul II* (with Chan Kin-chung, 1992), *A Roof with a View* (with Sandy Shaw, 1993), *Fist of Legend* (with Gordon Chan and Kee-to Lam, 1994), etc. while *The Tai Chi Master* (1993) is his own individual creation. In the late 1990s, Ip was recruited by Teddy Chen to be a script consultant for Chan's directorial work *Purple Storm* (1999); he revised the screenplay while filming was in progress. Ip went on to play 'script doctor' to titles *Hit Team* (2001) and *The Medallion* (2003). In 2001, he joined Emperor Motion Pictures as the creative director; in this new position, he produced *Every Dog Has His Date* (2001), *Demi-Haunted* (2002), and *New Blood* (2002).
