

TSANG Shan-fung 曾珊鳳

Actress

A Chaozhou opera huadan (young female) actress from Thailand's Lao Baoshunxiang Troupe, Tsang Shan-fung was a native of Chenghai, Guangdong. When Xintiancai Chaozhou Opera Troupe made its first foray into film in 1960, Tsang was invited to perform in A Wronged Daughter-in-Law (1960), a Tor Ying Film Co production. She originally played opposite Chan Chor-wai, but due to the fact that Tsang's appearance was older and more mature than Chan's, she was later paired with Cheung Ying-yin instead. The film also marked the beginning of the long-term partnership between Tsang and the Xintiancai troupe. Although Tsang later played Chan's mother in Judge Bao's Encounter with the Deposed Empress (aka Black Judge, 1961), after Phoenix Ornament (1961), Tsang and Chan became an established golden screen couple, playing the *huadan* (young female) and *xiaosheng* (young civil male) roles in over 30 Chaozhou-dialect films that include Reincarnation (1961), Justice and Revenge (1962), Madam Lan Ching (1962), The Misplaced Love-Token (1962), Prince Lau Chiang (1962), Unworldly Event (1962), Fairy Pearl (1963), Four Appeals (1964), Mermaid Story (1965), and The Heroic Pair (Part 1 & 2, 1967). Tsang might have won the hearts of melodrama fans with her tragic heroine roles but she was equally adept in comedies such as Fairy Pearl, Four Appeals and Mermaid Story, garnering praise for her vivid performances. Her convincing performance in The Heroic Pair, a film filled with martial art sequences, was a testimony to her work ethic and determination to expand her range.

When the production of Chaozhou-dialect films gradually fell into decline in 1966, the Xintiancai troupe went on a tour across Thailand, with Tsang and Chan serving as the female and male leads, performing in the operas *The Misplaced Love-Token* and *The Princess Falls in Love*.
