

## YEUNG Man 楊敏 (b. 1938.5.28)

## **Actress**

Born Yeung Kwong-yuk, Yeung Man was a native of Chao'an, Guangdong. She joined the amateur Federation of Industry and Commerce Drama Group during her formative years to train as a Chaozhou opera performer. Mentored by Su Jincheng, she specialised in *huadan* (young female) roles. After she completed her training, Yeung went on to become a professional opera performer and occasionally served as the dubbing vocalist for Chaozhou-dialect dubbed Cantonese films. For instance, she provided the Chaozhou-dialect singing voice for Ng Kwan-lai's character in My Wife Married My Brother (1957). Yeung moved to Hong Kong in 1958. At the invitation of actressproducer Fanny Ha, she starred in the Yifan Film Company production, At the Wharf (1961), under the stage name Pak Wan-sin. She later joined the Dongshan Chaozhou Music Company as a feature performer in many Tung Shan Film Co. productions under the stage name Yeung Man. Her filmography includes Jin Yunu Beats Sense into Her Heartless Husband (1961), Princess Chang Ping (1961), Yu Tang Chun Brought Before the Court (Part 1 & 2, 1961-62), Two Imperial Sons-in-Law (aka Double Imperial Sons-in-Law, 1961), The Pearl and the Sword (1962), the short film Suing Her Own Husband from the omnibus film Chaozhou Opera Panorama (1962), Two Annulled Marriages (1962), The Huntsman's Tale (1962), Story of the White Fan (1962) and The Perfumed Ball (aka Twin Charms, 1963). In September of 1963, Yeung was invited by production manager, Hsi Kin to star in the Ching Shan Film Co. production Third Madam Teaches Her Son a Lesson (1963). She was also featured in Romantic Autumn (1964), from the Fanny Ha-owned Ngai Yip Film Co. Over the span of her career, Yeung was featured in some ten Chaozhou-dialect films. During the mid-1960s, she toured Thailand with other Chaozhou opera stars such as Chong Suetkuen, Shek Ling, Ho Yik-tsang and Ng Chak, performing such Chaozhou opera classics as The Pearl Pagoda, Dream of the Red Chambers and Jinhua the Herder. Yeung now resides in Hong Kong.
